SHUFLY Chaplains Served Our Spiritual Needs During Stressful Times By David H. Hugel

SHUFLY Marines relied on the Navy to meet their medical, dental and spiritual needs. When the MABS-16 sub unit #2 Marines refurbished the old French base that was to become the SHUFLY living compound, they converted one of the old barracks into a small chapel with an office for the chaplain. During the summer and fall of 1963, the resident chaplain was Lt. Herman F. Wendler.

Since Chaplain Wendler was a Protestant minister, he shared the duty for conducting weekly worship services with a Catholic priest from the nearby Air Force base, Capt. Thomas McManus. Every Sunday, Wendler would hold a Protestant service for SHUFLY Marines, while Father McManus conducted Mass for the Air Force troops. Following their services, they would each jump into a jeep for the short drive to the other base where they held another service for members of their faith stationed there.

I don't know what arrangements Chaplain Wender had made at the Air Force chapel, but at our base he set up a system for playing organ music to accompanying our signing hymns. Lacking an organ, Wendler improvised by having his father, who was a minister back in the states, record tapes of hymns from the Navy Hymnbook that he shipped to Vietnam periodically. Every Sunday, a volunteer sat in the chaplain's office behind the wall at the rear of the chapel to operate a tape recorder, wired to speakers in the chapel, that played the prerecorded hymn.

Lacking timely newspaper and news broadcasts, Chaplain Wendler filled this information gap by publishing a mimeograph daily newsletter to keep Marines up to date on what was happening in the outside world. In an effort to bolster the spiritual well being of Marines, Chaplain Wendler began the practice of reading a nightly prayer over the base PA system every evening just before lights out. He was also available during the week to talk with Marines about their spiritual and personal concerns.


Occasionally, a Catholic chaplain from MCAF Futema Okinawa would fly down to Da Nang for special events. On one sad occasion Father "Hoot" Gibson co-officiated at a memorial service for Marines and Navy medical personnel killed in a helicopter crash. On another more joyous visit, Father Edward Kane coordinated the distribution of toys and clothing donated by a stateside Catholic charity to children at the Da Nang orphanage, run by Catholic nuns.

They didn't garner much attention, but our chaplains were always there when we needed them.


Chaplain, Father Edward Kane, assisted by Marine volunteers, distributes toys to boys and girls at the Catholic orphanage in Da Nang.

MCAS Rose Garden Marines Celebrate 40th Anniversary of Operations During Vietnam War By David H. Hugel

To meet renewed North Vietnamese aggression during the closing days of the Vietnam War, MAG-15 was deployed to Da Nang in April 1972, but facing limitations on American troop levels, Marines were soon looking for another base of operations. In May, Task Force Delta was formed to refurbish a Royal Thai Air Force base at Nam Phong, Thailand as the future home for MAG-15 operations.

In surveying the proposed site for the airfield, 1st MAW C.G., Maj. Gen. Leslie Brown recognized the challenge of converting the meager rundown facility into an operational Marine Corps airbase. In <u>U. S. Marines in Vietnam 1971-72</u>, the Marine Corps' official history of the Vietnam War, Gen. Brown observed: "All the place had really was a runway and nothing else except a lot of rain, a lot of heat, and a lot of logistical problems to be resolved."

An advance party of Task Force Delta Marines arrived at Nam Phong in late May to begin their daunting task of building facilities to support the projected 3,200 men who would be conducting operations from the base. Assisted by Navy Seabees, they built 310 strong-back tents, 128 administrative and maintenance facilities, a bomb dump, and fuel storage tanks for more than half a million gallons of aviation and bulk fuel.

The first aircraft arrived at Nam Phong, which was quickly dubbed MCAS Rose Garden after a popular Marine recruiting poster of the time, in mid-June 1972. Rose Garden became the base of operations for MAG -15, including F-4 Phantom squadrons VMFA-115 and VMFA-232, and A-6A Intruders from VMA 533, that flew combat missions in Laos and North Vietnam. Their missions included mining harbors, attacking economic targets, and bombing missions to reduce the flow of supplies from North Vietnam.

Task Force Delta concluded operations at Nam Phong with a ceremony lowering the American flag the morning of September 21, 1973, marking, according to the Marine Corps Historical Division, the end of Marine Corps participation in the Southeast Asian War. During their 15 months of operations at Nam Phong, Marines of Task Force Delta flew 10, 215 combat sorties massing an impressive 30, 998 flight hours.

To mark the 40th anniversary of MCAS Rose Garden beginning operations at Nam Phong, sixty-eight Marines and their guests attended a reunion at a hotel near the Marine Corps Base at Quantico, Virginia over the 2012 Memorial Day weekend. According to reunion coordinator, Harry Delamater, the reunion included a visit to the nearby National Museum of the Marine Corps, after which they were given a bus tour of MCB Quantico.

The highlight of the weekend was a banquet featuring a special guest, former Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Marine General Peter Pace. In October 1972, as a captain, General Pace was deployed to Nam Phong to serve as operations officer and later executive officer of the MAG-15 security element detached from the 3rd Marine Division to provide base security. In moving remarks to the audience, Gen. Pace described the pain of having Marines under his command killed during his first tour in Vietnam as a 2nd Lieutenant and reminisced about his tour at Nam Phong with many of those with whom he had served. There was also a ceremony paying tribute to the Marine Aviators who gave their lives while serving at Nam Phong, and to remember Rose Garden Marines who have died since leaving Vietnam.



Scholarship Requirements and Details

The First Marine Aircraft Wing Association, Vietnam Service will award up to five scholarships of \$500 each during Reunion 2013.

To qualify for a scholarship, applicants must meet the following qualifications:

Be a First Marine Aircraft Wing Association, Vietnam Service member in good standing (i.e., dues are paid up to date), their spouse, dependent or direct descendent. Further, the member must have a minimum of one-year membership as of June 1, 2013.

-OR

Be a spouse, dependent, or direct descendent of a deceased member of the First MAW Assn. VN Service -OR

Be a spouse, dependent, or direct descendent of a Marine or member of another military service, who lost his/her life while serving in Vietnam with the First Marine Aircraft Wing.

-AND

Applicant must be currently enrolled in an accredited college, university, or trade school and be in good academic standing.

Applicant will be required to submit an essay of 300-350 words. The applicant can choose one of the following topics:

What the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial means to me.

What all Americans can do to solve the energy crisis.

How I plan to use my education to aid society.

Why I support our Marines in harm's way.

To compete for a scholarship, applicants must submit their essay in accordance with the following instructions:

The essay must be typed. **Do not include applicant's name on the essay page**. Attach a cover page with the applicants name, address, phone number and email address. The cover page must also include the name of the First MAW Assn. VN Service member and membership number, along with the applicant's relationship to the member (spouse, son, daughter, grandchild etc.).

Verification from a counselor or other school official confirming that the applicant is enrolled. This letter needs to be on school letterhead.

A copy of the student transcripts
