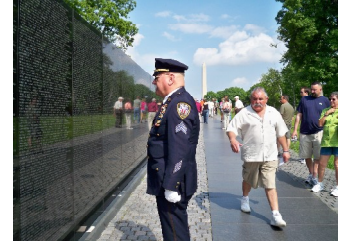

It's official; we are all Marines for life

For years there has been a debate over what to call Marines no longer on active duty. Those who are retired have traditionally been referred to retired Marines, while those who served a tour or more but who left before retiring have been called former Marines. I personally like the phrase Gen. Leonard Chapman used in a letter I received from him years ago when he was Commandant, which he closed by saying, it was always good to hear from "Marines no longer in uniform."

All these terms are now passé according to recent comments by the Marine Corps' new Commandant, Gen. James Amos. Speaking at a town hall meeting soon after becoming Commandant, Gen. Amos declared: "A Marine is a Marine. I set that policy two weeks ago - there's no such thing as a former Marine. You're a Marine, just in a different uniform and you're in a different phase of your life. But you'll always be a Marine because you went to Parris Island, San Diego or the hills of Quantico. There's no such thing as a former Marine."



Eyewitness to Marine Corps History By David H. Hugel

On a sunny fall day last October history was made at the Marine Barracks in Washington, D.C. Gen. James Amos became the first Naval Aviator to assumed command of the United States Marine Corps, as it's 40th Commandant.

Several former Commandants joined numerous Washington officials and dignitaries for the ceremony at which Secretary of Defense Robert Gates was the featured guest. During his remarks, Secretary Gates honored out going Commandant Gen. James Conway for his forty years of service to our country and Marine Corps, and welcomed Gen. Amos to his new post. A transfer of the Battle Color of the Marine Corps carried by Sergeant Major of the Marine Corps, Carlton Kent, symbolized the transfer of command from Conway to Amos. Following a Pass in Review by the assembled troops and Drum and Bugle Corps, Gen Conway and his wife Annett were serenaded off the Parade Field to the tune "Waltzing Matilda," in recognition of his former service as Commanding Officer of the 1st Marine Division. A reception followed for the invited guests in the garden of the Commandant's House.

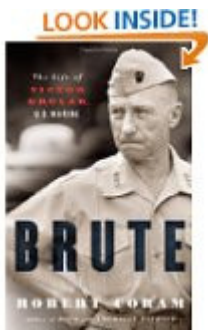

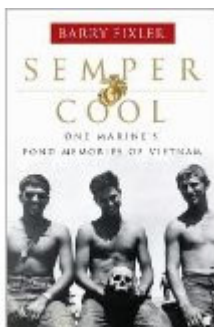


Gen. James Amos addresses the distinguished guests attending the Change of Command ceremony during which he became the Marine Corps' new Commandant.

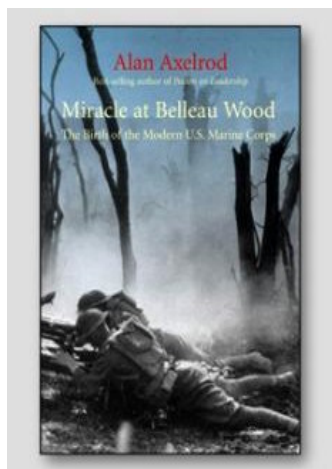
USMC BOOK RECOMMENDATIONS

Semper Cool: One Marine's Fond Memories of Vietnam is the true-life memoir of a Vietnam veteran. Author Barry Fixler enlisted in the United States Marine Corps as a teenager; he experienced terrible violence and hand-to-hand combat at the Siege of Khe Sanh, and gives the reader a boots-on-the-ground view of war. Yet he had positive as well as negative experiences, and ultimately the hardships he endured shaped him into a patriotic American



In "Miracle at Belleau Wood: The Birth of the Modern U.S. Marine Corps," Alan Axelrod has demonstrated his mastery at portraying battle at its most brutal and bloodiest. The fight for Belleau Wood is like a bayonet in the belly every step of the way.

The distant mirror that Alan Axelrod shows us reflects the fearful face of life and death in World War I. Called "The Great War," it was meant to be the "war to end all wars." It was neither, and into that hell went the 4th Marine Brigade, and against all odds, it turned the tide of an enemy onslaught that might have changed the course of history.

A Photo Tour of Vietnam Today By David H. Hugel*

Have you every wondered what it's like in Vietnam today? I know I have; I've even thought about going back to see how the old Da Nang airbase and city have changed since I was stationed there nearly 50 years ago.

Like many things in life I haven't gotten around to it yet, but recently I had an opportunity to see some of the sights in Vietnam today through the eyes of a friend, Ron Zaczek, who has made that journey not once, but three times since 1996.

Ron was a Huey crew chief who flew with VMO-3 out of Phu Bai in 1967. Ron and I met at a reception that was part of the celebration for the opening of the National Museum of the Marine Corps in 2006. After several conversations with him, I was inspired to write an article for Leatherneck about his fascinating story that is scheduled to run in upcoming issues of Leatherneck this summer.

Ron, like a growing number of Vietnam veterans, did more than think about his days in Vietnam, he booked a trip for himself and his wife to visit there in 1996, and returned in 2007 and 2008. The photos that follow were taken by Ron during his 2007 and 2008 trips and offer a picture of a country that has changed a great deal since we were all stationed there back in the 1960s and 1970s.

While itineraries may vary slightly, most commercials tours of Vietnam are about two weeks in duration and begin with a flight from the states to a major Asian city like Hong Kong or Seoul, Korea. From there it's off to Hanoi for a couple days then on to cities in the south like Da Nang, Phu Bai, Hue and Dong Ha, with appropriate side trips to nearby tourist and battle sites like Marble Mountain, China Beach, the Hue Citadel, Khe Sanh Combat Base, Conn Thien and other places so familiar to Marines who served in Vietnam.

For those thinking about making the journey, Ron offers a word of warning, not to expect to see the country and bases as you remember them. Much of that has been the torn down and replaced by modern buildings or left to be reclaimed by the tropical foliage. As one example of how much the country has changed, the 2008 population of Da Nang was 900,000 people. He found the Vietnamese to be truly friendly people who like Americans, accounted for perhaps by the fact that a large portion of the population was born after the war ended. Ron cautions, however, not to take the official tourist information signs too seriously as the Communist government often provides its own propogandized version of the war highlighting their accomplishments, which in many cases are grossly distorted.

For anyone interested in taking a tour of Vietnam, Ron recommends either of the two tour companies he used, Military Historical Tours (www.miltours.com; 800-722-950) or Vietnam Battlefield Tours (www.vietnambattlefieldtours.com 877-321-9277). More details on upcoming tours and prices, can be found on their web sites or by calling their toll free numbers.

SCHOLARSHIP

The First MAW Association will award up to five scholarships of \$500 each during Reunion 2011

To qualify for a scholarship, applicants must meet the following qualifications:

Be a FIRSTMAW ASSN. regular member in good standing (i.e., dues are up to date), their spouse, dependent, or direct descendent. Further, the member must have a minimum of one-year membership as of June 1, 2011.

-OR

Be a spouse, dependent, or direct descendent of a deceased member of the First MAW Assn.

-OR

Be a spouse, dependent, or direct descendent of a Marine or member of another military service, who lost his/her life while serving in Vietnam with the First Marine Aircraft Wing.

Applicant must be presently enrolled in an accredited college, university, or trade school and be in good academic standing.

Applicant will be required to submit an essay of 300 – 350 words. The applicant can choose one of the following topics:

- 1. What the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Means to Me.**
- 2. What all Americans can do to solve the energy crisis**
- 3. How I plan to use my education to aide society**
- 4. Why I support our Marines who are in harms way**

To compete for a scholarship, applicants must submit their essay in accordance with the following instructions:

The essay must be typed. Do not include applicants name on the essay. Attach a separate sheet of paper containing applicant's name, member's name and membership number, address, and phone number.

A letter from a counselor or other school official verifying that applicant is currently enrolled. The letter must be on school letterhead.

A copy of student transcripts

The essay must be postmarked no later than August 30 2011.
